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#### Fire Chief's Message



#### **Equipment / Purchases**

Some of the larger items placed in-service during 2017 were:

- A compressed breathing air station, which is used to fill our Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus air bottles
- Emergency Reporting records management software, which has made a tremendous in how the department operates for the good in managing our records and reports .
- An electric positive pressure fan (PPV) used primarily to rid smoke from a structure without contributing carbon monoxide (CO). CO is a by-product of fire and our PPV fans that run on gasoline.

#### **Facilities**

Bangor Township's first fire station was originally part of the administration building constructed at 3921 Wheeler Road in 1956, and has received several modifications since then. This building (Station 7) is in reasonable shape, however, has limitations on vehicles and equipment it can house due to number of parking bays and ceiling height. The building also has energy efficiency and vehicle exhaust issues, the latter of which is a significant health concern.

Station 6, located at 1000 W. North Union was converted from a plumbing shop in 1963, and covers the south end of the Township. This station also has limitations on size, height, efficiency, and vehicle exhaust.

A feasibility study and long-term funding plan for station planning has been recommended to determine number, costs, location and size of facilities to best serve our community's growing needs. However, budget constraints have prevented this plan from being initiated.

#### **Training**

Training is a daily event in Bangor and occurs days, nights, and weekends. The department breaks training into three categories, in-house, outside, and shift level. The total number of department training hours in 2017 was over 1900, which does not include our fire academy students. Our Emergency Reporting software has revolutionized how we track and report training hours, but there is a learning curve for staff and we are still improving on inputting data.

#### **Grants & Gifts**



The below list provides details to the funds received in 2017:
