

**ORDINANCE #134
NO WAKE ORDINANCE**

ESTABLISHMETN OF "NO-WAKE" SPEED AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE SPEED OF VESSELS AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE SAFE USE OF THE WATERS IN THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BANGOR, BAY COUNT; ENACTED UNDER THE PUBLIC ACTS OF 1967, AS AMENDED (M.S.A. 18.1287 (17)), BEING IDENTICAL TO STATE ADMINISTRATIVE RULES FILED IN THE OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BANGOR, BAY COUNTY MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P.A. 1967, as amended, M.S.A. 18.1287 (8).

SECTION 2. (By authority conferred on the commission of Natural Resources by Section 13 of Act No. 303 of the Public Acts of 1967, as amended, being § 281.1013 of the Michigan Compiled Laws). Regulation No. 9, Bay County. R 281.709.5 Saginaw River; slow-no-wake speed.

Rule 5. On the waters of the Saginaw River located within the Township of Bangor, Bay County, it is unlawful for the operator of a vessel to exceed a slow-no-wake speed.

SECTION 3. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. Violations of this ordinance are a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) together with costs of prosecution or imprisonment in the County Jail or such other place of detention as the court may prescribe, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or said fine, costs of prosecution, and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 5. This ordinance and the various parts, sections, sub-sections, provisions, sentences and clauses are severable. If any part of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or invalid it is declared the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected hereby.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its final publication in the Bay City Democrat, a newspaper circulating within the boundary the Charter Township of Bangor, on or before the 22nd day of September, 1983.
